
DWC welcomes new CEO

DWC's new Chief Executive, Chris Mackenzie, will start his new role on 18 May.

Mr Mackenzie's appointment was announced by DWC Chair John Sturgeon last month. "The Trustees are delighted Chris has agreed to join DWC. He is well qualified for the position, and has a unique knowledge of the organisation and how it operates," says Mr Sturgeon.

Chris Mackenzie has had a long involvement with DWC. He was the Government Appointed Trustee on the Interim West Coast Development Trust prior to the establishment of DWC. In the last few years he has been involved in the review of the Trust Deed and DWC's ten year Strategic Plan.

He is currently working as a Senior Advisor with the Canterbury Earthquake Recovery Authority (CERA) and will move to the West Coast with his wife when he takes up the Chief Executive position at DWC. As well as being involved with the implementation group of CERA, he is the Independent Chair of the Horizontal Infrastructure Governance Group, responsible for setting the priorities for the infrastructure rebuild.



Mr Mackenzie says he is looking forward to working with DWC. "I have had a long relationship with the Trust and look forward to the new role. My first few months in the job will involve driving the length of the West Coast talking to councils, business people and industry groups," he says.

Businesses wanting to upskill staff in leadership and governance are being encouraged to get in touch with DWC.

Last month 14 business people from a variety of backgrounds graduated from the fourth West Coast Leadership and Governance programme, bringing the total number of graduates to 50 people. Participants study all aspects of leadership and governance as part of the intensive 12 month programme.

DWC Business Support Manager Nelia Heersink says she is now working on organising a fifth programme and she would love to talk to new businesses keen to get involved.

"A couple of our founding sponsors are not partipating in the next programme as most of their senior staff have now completed the programme. This leaves room for new businesses to come on board which will widen the industry base and add a new dynamic to the programme," she says.

DWC launched the programme in 2011 in conjunction with Westland Milk Products. This year participants came from Westland Milk

Products, Grey District Council, Buller District Council, Westland District Council, Martin & Co Mitre 10 Westport, Buller Holdings and Buller Electricity.

Karamea dairy farmer Paul McClintock was sponsored onto the most recent programme by Westland Milk Products.

"As a small business owner I would highly recommend the programme and found the governance aspects the most valuable. DWC deserves kudos for organising the programme and people should take advantage of it if they get the opportunity to take part," he says.

Past graduates have gone on to join boards of West Coast and New Zealand businesses, not for profit organisations and community groups.

DWC Chair John Sturgeon says the sponsors who support the programme should be congratulated. "Their involvement benefits both their own business and the wider community with dozens of graduates ready to step up into a variety of governance roles on the West Coast," he says

Financial Overview

As DWC has previously indicated, the fall in the equity markets through January and February has seen a loss of investment value in excess of \$1m. YTD revenue to 29 February of \$5.9m is \$500k below budget.

Expenses remain below budget. However taking into account the District Economic Stimulus Fund (DESF) and Digital Enablement Fund which were not budgeted, at the end of February DWC had recorded a loss of \$1.8m; almost \$4.4m behind target.

As at 29 February 2016 DWC had total assets of \$126.3m and equity of \$110m.
